



#### **Definition**

- Harm reduction connotes that there are users who do not wish, or are unable to quit drug use
- Harm reduction does not support substance use
- It Is concerned with safer use, managed use, Treatment, recovery, abstinence and prevention
- Encourages inclusive and equitable healthcare for people who use substances









#### Rationale

• Risky and problematic use will always expose people to related harms, and these users still need to be kept as safe and healthy as possible, even as they continue to use

#### **STRATEGIES**

National Drug control Master Plan (NDCMP, 2021-2025) full harm reduction services are:

- 1. Needle and Syringe Programmes (NSP)
- 2. Medically Assisted Therapy (MAT) and other evidence-based drug dependence treatment
- 3. HIV Testing Services (HTS)
- 4. Antiretroviral Therapy (ART)
- 5. Prevention and treatment of sexually transmitted infections (STIs)
- 6. Condom distribution programmes for people who inject drugs and their sexual partners
- 7. Targeted information, education and communication (IEC) for people who inject drugs and their sexual partners





- Few or none existent harm reductionist








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
